LAKE STATUS SUMMARY



LOCATION: Lake Mingo is located 8 miles northwest of Danville in Kennekuk Cove County Park and is operated by the Vermilion County Conservation District. For more information about Lake Mingo and Kennekuk Cove County Park, visit the web page <http://www.vccd.org/gikennekuk.html>

DESCRIPTION: Lake Mingo is 170 acres and was built in 1980 and was renovated in 1983. The lake has a maximum depth of 38 feet and an average depth of 13.5 feet. There is a 9.9 horsepower limit, boat decals are required, and there is one boat launch.

STATUS OF THE SPORT FISHERY: The IDNR Division of Fisheries has been active in the management of the fisheries in Lake Mingo since the lake was constructed. The lake currently receives stockings of channel catfish. The following information is a summary of the major sport fisheries based on periodic fish population surveys.

Largemouth Bass – During the most recent electrofishing survey, the catch rate for bass was 109.8 per hour. The average catch rate for the past four surveys is 107.4 bass per hour. Of the bass collected over 8 inches, 65% were longer than 12 inches, 19% were longer than 15 inches, and 6% were longer than 20 inches. A new bass regulation was implemented in 2015 to allow anglers to remove bass less than 15 inches and also reduce the number of bass over 15 inches allowed. The 2016 survey resulted in the highest catch rate for legal bass ever in Lake Mingo. Lake Mingo has a good bass fishery.

Bluegill - The bluegill population is regulated by a length limit that protects the larger bluegill from overharvest. Only 5 bluegill over 8 inches can be kept, but a total of 20 bluegill can be harvested and the regulation is helping to improve the bluegill fishery. Approximately 54% of the bluegill collected during the most recent survey were longer than 6 inches. No bluegill were collected over 8 inches, but 10% of the bluegill were longer than 7 inches. The bluegill fishery has improved under the maximum size limit, but there is plenty of room for improvement. Lake Mingo has a fair bluegill fishery.

Redear Sunfish - The number of redear sunfish has fluctuated over the years and may be due to the amount of aquatic vegetation in Lake Mingo around the time of sampling. Redear sunfish are heavily dependant upon having adequate amounts of aquatic vegetation. Even though the redear numbers change, there are always 7 to 9-inch redear in the fishery. On average, 68% of the redear collected are larger than 7 inches. However, in the most recent fish survey the percentage for redear sunfish over 7 inches was 100%. Reproduction has been low the past few years and is resulting in a decline in redear sunfish numbers.

Channel Catfish - The State Hatchery System stocks channel catfish each year to maintain a quality catfish fishery. The catfish fishery in Lake Mingo commonly produces catfish from 1 to 10 pounds. With the continued efforts from the hatchery, the catfish fishery will provide anglers a great fishing opportunity.

Crappie – In 2008, a 9” length limit and a 15 per day harvest limit was placed on crappie. The new regulation quickly improved the quality of the crappie fishery. For the first time in 10 years, crappie over 10 inches were collected during the 2010 fish survey. However, during the most recent fish survey the catch rate declined from 36 per hour in 2014 to just 4.5 per hour in 2016.

FISHING REGULATIONS: 2 Pole and Line Fishing Only, Except bowfishing is allowed from a boat.
